Nursery

This week in Donaldson class we have been focussing on differences between ourselves and our families. At the beginning of the week we read 'We are all different' and considered what makes us different from one another such as the length and type of hair we have; the colour of our eyes and skin; the languages we speak; our likes and dislikes. Following this we produced our own self-portraits. We then read Who's in My Family? by Robie H. Harris to introduce the concept of families and considered different types of families. After reading the text, we talked about our own families and the people they are made up of. In maths, the children enjoyed building towers out of Multilink cubes to show how many people live in their home, estimating whether they have more, less or the same number of people living in their home as their friends', comparing their towers with their friends' towers and finally calculating the amount of people who live in their home.

In phonics, we have continued to focus on environmental sounds and tuning into sounds. The children enjoyed guessing and identifying hidden objects.

Reception

This week in Reception we have been exploring the topic "Marvellous me!" and focussing on how we can take care of our bodies. We have spoken about different food and how some foods are healthier for us than other foods. The children really enjoyed making pretend lunch boxes and choosing healthy foods they would like to eat.

Our key text this week was the traditional tale "The Gingerbread Man". During these read aloud sessions children were encouraged to act out and repeat the phrases from the story. We then extended the story and students role played the story using masks and puppets.

The children have been having so much fun in the playground this week. Our large Oak tree has been showering down acorns and children have been collecting, counting and making "acorn soup" for the squirrels in the trees.

We look forward to meeting parents next week on 12th October for after school parent meetings. Please sign up with Mrs MacLean after school to choose an available five-minute time slot.






Year 2 Browne:




Year 3 Walliams:

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
ear 4 Snicket:

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
Year 6 Shakespeare:


