#### Nursery

This week in Donaldson class the children have enjoyed learning about Diwali – the Festival of Lights, which is traditionally celebrated by Hindus, Sikhs and Jains and is probably the most well-known of the Hindu festivals. We read the story of *Rama and Sita* – the children had great fun exploring the small world scene setter of the story, acting out the story and building bridges like the monkeys did in the story.

We also learnt about how Hindus' prepare for and celebrate the festival, created our own Diva lamps and firework pictures, made Coconut Barfi and explored pattern creating our own Rangoli patterns and making patterns with our bodies and musical instruments. A fun week has been had by all.



#### Reception

This week, Jeffers class has spent a lot of time thinking about Remembrance Day. We have made our own poppies and made a giant poppy mural to remind us of those who gave up their today for our tomorrow. In maths, we are still focussing on number formation and understanding the value of number. We have used counters, blocks, pictures, playdough and tally marks to show the values of different numbers.

Our story for the week was *The Three Billy Goats Gruff*. We have had lots of fun doing actions while reading our story together. Our Jeffers class are phonics super stars. Many students are beginning to read short 3 letter words and are very proud of themselves. Name writing is another area we have seen huge improvements. Well done to all our students!









### Year 1 & 2: Dahl and Browne

Both years have been exploring the creations of an artist called Andy Goldsworthy.

Year 1 and 2 joined together as a collaborative effort to create outdoor art that was inspired by this artist.

Andy Goldsworthy grew up on a farm and was inspired by the nature around home. The children used the autumn leaves in varying hues, combined with twigs and stones from the environment to produce spiral based representations.

They began by creating spirals with our bodies and then transferred it to create art work with a group or partner.

The two classes really enjoyed working with each other.







### Year 2 (Anthony Class)

This week, Anthony class have been very busy. They participated in a gymnastics PE session where the children showed off their skills in balancing.

They also worked as a team to decorate their classroom working wall. They painted it in chalk board paint, which was great fun.







### Year 3 Walliams:

Walliams worked hard on their Remembrance writing this week. They learned to understand and empathise with the soldiers and support workers who have made sacrifices over the years. Zara's writing really shows an understanding of the conditions with which British soldiers were faced on the front lines in WW1 and everyone in year 3 should be proud of the writing they achieved this week.

### **Poetry Corner**


Each week, to compliment out 'Supporting Reading at Home' page, we will post a poem for you to read and enjoy with your child at home.
