Early Years Foundation Stage Newsletter 13th January 2023

It has been lovely to welcome the children back into school after the Christmas break. They have settled back in fantastically and have it has been great to see them back in their routine and interacting with their friends – old and new.

Last Thursday and Friday we focused on winter. We went on a winter walk looking We started the week by sharing the beautifully illustrated book *Jack Frost* by Kazuno Kohara. After reading, we discussed the illustrations and the use of cool colours to depict winter and used the text as a stimulus to create our very own 'cool' artwork. In phonics we reviewed all phonemes and tricky words taught to date and in maths we explored the number zero.

This week, on Tuesday the children were introduced to our topic for this term, when they searched the school for Miss Rainfray's polar bear who they eventually found in the school office holding the well-loved story *We're Going on a Bear Hunt* by Michael Rosen and Helen Oxenbury, with a note which <u>said</u> "Welcome this this terms learning journey – Bears."

This week in addition to reading the story and learning Makaton actions to help us recall the story, we have gone on our very own Bear Hunt, re-enacting the story as we went and started our very own story maps. We also have mindmapped what we currently know (or think we know) about bears and what we want to find out.

The children thoroughly enjoyed their first PE session on Tuesday. Our focus for PE this term is dance.

In maths we have been learning about number bonds to 5 and the different ways to make 5.

In phonics we have learnt more about Harry Hat Man who makes a 'h' sound, Bouncy Ben who makes a 'b' sound and Firefighter Fred who makes a 'f sound. We have also reviewed all tricky words taught to date and learnt four more tricky words – oh, for, ok, that, says.

We are continuing to work on name recognition and writing. The children enjoyed finding each letter of their name and printing covers for their writing books.

Next Tuesday 17th January we have Forest School and PE. Please ensure your child is sent to school in suitable clothing for Forest School and that they bring their PE kit to school on Tuesday. In addition, please ensure that ALL clothing is labelled – including shoes.










Year 1: Dahl

Dahl class has had a flying start to the year, making a start on their new topic of 'Toys through time!' using the text 'Traction Man' to support their learning.



Year 2: Anthony

Anthony Class have had a great start to the term. This week they have been working on spelling skills. They played a game where the children had to work together to build different words in a given time. During maths they are working on recognising numbers to 20 and above and have enjoyed a game of number bingo. The children have also explored the concept of weight and have used the scales to find objects that are heavier or lighter than the weights.

During Guiding Reading this week, Year 2 have been working on 'skimming and scanning' techniques to help locate answers to specific questions. Well done everyone for showing so much determination and for having so much fun!





Year 3 Walliams:


Students in Walliams mastered the 'A' chord in their ukulele lesson this week. Walliams used software tools to handle data. They created bar charts and pie graphs from data sets recorded on a spreadsheet.



Year 4 Snicket:

Year 4 have enjoyed learning what the names for different pets are, in French. They did a great job matching the words to pictures and pronouncing each word with a fabulous French accent! In Maths they have been hard at work identifying 'Factor Pairs' by creating different arrays of a given number, with counters.









Year 5 Blake:

The children then designed their own repeated patterns in a similar style. They came up with some very creative designs!

Year 6 have made a fantastic start to 2023! They have begun our fractions topic in maths and are learning all about Greek mythology to inspire our writing in English lessons. Our topic of Ancient Greece got off to an energetic start with our own mini-Olympics session. In science, we have begun learning about light and investigated how light travels in straight lines.


Parent-Child Attachment Pay Workshop

<u>'This May Help'</u> inititative

We are pleased to announce the launch of <u>This May Help</u>, a new national initiative providing mental health advice to parents and carers. <u>This May Help</u> is aimed at parents and carers who may have concerns about their child's mental health and is part funded by the Quality Improvement Taskforce for Children and Young People's Mental Health, Learning Disability and Autism Inpatient Services.

The website gives easy-to-follow advice to help families manage their child's mental health. This advice was developed by NHS professionals and parents who've been through their own child's mental health journey. Parents and carers have shared advice that helped them and that may also help other families.

The advice covered on <u>This May Help</u> includes: self-harm, gaming and online activity, teenagers safety, eating disorders, school avoidance and preparing for a children and adolescent mental health services (CAMHS) appointment.

These subjects were chosen by families and young people who have gone through their own mental health challenges. Gary Lineker, Myleene Klass, and Tanni Grey-Thompson are amongst 16 presenters featured in the films.

You can also use the space to work, read, board games, newspapers or socialise.



Forest School

Summer-born children

As you may be aware, while most children start school in the September following their 4th birthday, they do not reach Compulsory School Age (CSA) until the term after their 5th birthday. For children who are under CSA, once a place has been accepted, parents/guardians can decide for their child to start a pattern of part time attendance or a delayed start until later in the school year.

DOB	May start school full or part time from	Must start school full time no later than
1 st Sept 2018 – 31 st Dec 2018	September 2023	January 2024
1 st Jan 2019 – 31 st Mar 2019	September 2023	April 2024 (Usually following the Easter Holidays)
1 st Apr 2019 – 31 st Aug 2019 (also known as a Summer Born child)	September 2023	September 2024 (starting from Year 1)

If you think this arrangement may apply to you, please use the Parental <u>advice</u> from the Department of Education to help you make a decison.
