Early Years Foundation Stage

In literacy this week we have focussed on non—fiction texts linked to our topic this term – Bears. We discussed the difference between fiction and non-fiction and how to identify a non-fiction text. We've read different non-fiction texts and used the internet to search for facts on different bears. Key facts the children have learnt about include the different continents and countries different types of bear come from, what they eat, how tall they are and how heavy they are. They have applied their phonic knowledge by writing their very own Bear Facts information leaflets and produced some fantastic observational paintings of their favourite bears.

Tuesday was Safer Internet Day. The children listened to the story of Smartie the Penguin which explores how to be safe on the internet and discussed what Smartie should do when he came across issues including pop ups and in app purchasing, cyberbullying and upsetting images. They learnt Smartie's song Before you tap and click...You need to stop and think...And TELL someone!

In phonics the children have learnt about the *Letterland* characters *Yellow Yo-Yo Man and Fix-it Max*. They have also been trying really hard to remember the tricky words they have been taught so far. In maths we have explored pairs combining groups and addition.

Year 1 have concluded their topic of 'Toys' this term by producing an eye-catching display of toy puppets they produced using sewing skills! The results are toy-shop worthy! Well done Year 1.








Year 2: Browne






Year 5 Blake:


Parent-Child Attachment Pay Workshop

Pupils in each class took part in various activities linked to this year's Safer Internet Day. The theme was 'Want to talk about it? Making space for conversations about life online' and the annual focus sees thousands of organisations get involved to promote the safe, responsible and positive use of digital technology for children and young people.









The SENs Hub Community Group was founded in 2019 by Becky and Sarah, two local Mums. Their aim is to provide a supportive community for parents and carers of children and young people with SEND.

Between them Becky and Sarah have 5 children with Additional Needs, in all phases of primary, secondary and further education.

They currently offer weekly informal drop-ins during term time at The Future Store, Tunbridge Wells, a thriving, supportive Facebook community, relevant workshops and talks, family socials, counselling referrals, parent and carer evening socials plus signposting to other local groups and events.

'This May Help' inititative

We are pleased to announce the launch of <u>This May Help</u>, a new national initiative providing mental health advice to parents and carers. <u>This May Help</u> is aimed at parents and carers who may have concerns about their child's mental health and is part funded by the Quality Improvement Taskforce for Children and Young People's Mental Health, Learning Disability and Autism Inpatient Services.

The website gives easy-to-follow advice to help families manage their child's mental health. This advice was developed by NHS professionals and parents who've been through their own child's mental health journey. Parents and carers have shared advice that helped them and that may also help other families.

The advice covered on <u>This May Help</u> includes: self-harm, gaming and online activity, teenagers safety, eating disorders, school avoidance and preparing for a children and adolescent mental health services (CAMHS) appointment. These subjects were chosen by families and young people who have gone through their own mental health challenges. Gary Lineker, Myleene Klass, and Tanni Grey-Thompson are amongst 16 presenters featured in the films.

Applications for transfer to primary school for both the Reception year and Year 3 (junior school) in September 2023 will open on Friday 4 November 2022 and close on Monday 16 January 2023.

Summer-born children

As you may be aware, while most children start school in the September following their 4th birthday, they do not reach Compulsory School Age (CSA) until the term after their 5th birthday. For children who are under CSA, once a place has been accepted, parents/guardians can decide for their child to start a pattern of part time attendance or a delayed start until later in the school year.

DOB	May start school full or part time from	Must start school full time no later than
1 st Sept 2018 – 31 st Dec 2018	September 2023	January 2024
1 st Jan 2019 – 31 st Mar 2019	September 2023	April 2024 (Usually following the Easter Holidays)
1 st Apr 2019 – 31 st Aug 2019 (also known as a Summer Born child)	September 2023	September 2024 (starting from Year 1)

If you think this arrangement may apply to you, please use the Parental <u>advice</u> from the Department of Education to help you make a decison.
